### Multi-year emphasis and logo introduced

TAKEN IN PART FROM BISHOP GUSTAFSON'S VERBAL REPORT AT THE 2015 SYNOD ASSEMBLY

The theme of the 2015 Synod Assembly was **Leading With Hope**. This theme evolved in part out of the 2014 assembly theme

**Fear and Hope: Living at God's Table.** We saw then that both of those realities are present in our churches and our communities – both fear for the future and hope for the future, but that our most dominant characteristic as people of God is hope – hope that comes to us as a gift, hope that allows us to face the future with confidence because while we may not know what the future holds, we do know who holds the future.

The theme of **HOPE** will be a multi-year emphasis here in the Central States Synod. We're going to explore hope in four dimensions: Leadership (Leading with Hope), Stewardship (Giving in Hope), Discipleship (Growing in Hope), and Evangelism (Sharing Hope). # Message from Pastor David

**"Finally, brothers and sisters, pray for us, so that the word of the Lord may have free course and be glorified everywhere, just as it is among you,"**  
2 Thessalonians 3:1

*Grace and peace be to you in our Lord Jesus Christ!*

This fall begins something new at Redeemer. We are coming together between services to teach one another about the word. Young and old working together to make sure the generations are equipped beyond our walls with something so life giving. We have done wonderfully on Wednesday with Godly Play. It is a wonder to see the young ones pick up on the stories presented then make them their own. With our intergenerational curriculum we hope to have a similar affect on all of us as we present Scripture and work together to better understand it and pass it along so that the word has Free Course.

As an ELCA congregation we are more than just a little enclave sitting in the south part of Salina. We readily know that we connect with the other two congregations in town...we can see how we connect with churches in and around Lindsborg and further within area Three ministry. But we also connect with the other 176 congregations that make up Central States Synod. As many of you know denominational offices have struggled for several years. Money is tight...economy is sluggish...and keeping an individual congregation going can be daunting enough. But in our connecting to the larger body we have entrusted our synod staff with various tasks really too many to name here, but one among them is working to ensure pastoral leadership and call process be done in a healthy way in the synod. As of June, there are 30 congregations in process of call. As we look at a great number of pastors nearing retirement

age in our synod this number will either stay steady or grow in the next few years. They also work to form new worshipping communities in Central States. As money has become tight over the last several years we have seen the synod cut staff, cut programs, and restrict travel. This was considered necessary and has been offset with new ideas in how to get things done, but as many of you know you can only cut and restrict so much. Early this summer a letter was received from our

Bishop Roger Gustafson telling us of the deficit our synod treasurer foresees. With that the council decided to give an extra \$500 to help them with this issue.

Going beyond the synod level we also belong to about 10,000 congregations that make of the ELCA. We have different histories; different contexts but we are one in Christ. In June after the Supreme Court laid down its ruling that same-sex couples could be married we received a letter from our Presiding Bishop, Elizabeth Eaton. In this letter it recounted our 2009 decision regarding same-gender marriage that it would not be forced on any congregation, but those that decided to allow them would not be precluded from so doing. The letter went on to say: "According to this church's social statement on human sexuality, all decisions about recognizing, supporting and holding publicly accountable same-gender relationships are entrusted to congregations. Recognizing that the church is not of one mind on this subject, our 2009 actions provide that congregations and clergy should discern together whether to recognize such relationships and to what degree."

And further says:

"Pastors are to engage in conversation, discernment and partnership with the congregations who have called them prior to solemnizing or presiding over a same-gender marriage. On the other hand, no pastor is obligated to solemnize the marriage of any couple, same-gender or different-gender, whom the pastor cannot in good conscience marry.

As Lutheran Christians, we continue to be a church that engages in conversation and discernment in all aspects of our faith and life. Creating space for respectful conversation and dialogue continues to be an important part of our life together. A helpful resource for engaging in difficult conversations is "Talking Together as Christians about Tough Social Issues." (quotes from Presiding Bishop Eaton's letter on Supreme Court Marriage Ruling. <http://www.elca.org/News-and-Events/7759>) With this directive I feel it important as your pastor to engage in study, reflection, and conversation about this issue along with many other issues that seem to be front and center in our tumultuous world. So in the coming months I will be inviting you to sit down with one another and me. We all know it is not easy to follow Christ and at times we seem at odds with ourselves and one another, but in Christ we are one in our faith that he alone through grace saves us. We pray for the free course of the Lord's word and understand and believe that that Word has set us free to be God's people.

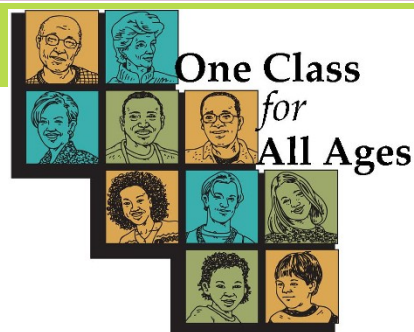

## A representative of Bread for the World, Ms. Kesi Marciano, will be with us during the Intergenerational Sunday School hour on September 20.

Bread for the World is a collective Christian voice urging our nation’s decisions makers to end hunger at home and abroad. Moved by God’s grace in Jesus Christ, we advocate for a world without hunger.

In the 1970s, Rev. Art Simon, the pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church on New York City’s Lower East Side, often found himself responding to emergency situations caused by hunger and poverty in his neighborhood. Simon, along with a dozen other church leaders in the area — Roman Catholics, Pres-

byterians, and Lutherans — began meeting to explore how they might address the local and global root causes of hunger. They saw a place for Christians to try to prevent hunger from happening in the first place rather than just reacting to it. In 1974, this group founded Bread for the World with the mission of ending hunger in the world by speaking out to their elected officials in Washington, D.C.

A representative of Bread for the World, Ms. Kesi Marciano, will be with
