Annual Meeting 2016

The Redeemer Congregation Council set the dates for the annual meetings of the Redeemer congregation for December 11, 2016, and January 22, 2017. At the first meeting we will elect council members, Nominating Committee members, Endowment Committee member, and Synod Assembly voting members. The proposed 2017 budget will be presented.

Briefly, at the December meeting the congregation will be informed about updating the Redeemer Lutheran Church Endowment Fund (2009 Redeemer Constitution, C14.02) and bringing our constitution into conformity with the Model Constitution for Congregations as approved by the 2016 Churchwide Assembly.

In January at the second meeting, the treasurer will review of the 2016 budget and members will vote to accept Redeemer's 2017 budget.

Below are the proposed 2009 Redeemer Constitution changes to be voted on at the January meeting:

C12.05c The Congregation Council may enter into contracts of up to \$1,500 (change to \$15,000) for items not included in the budget.

C13.02 A Nominating Committee of six (change to three) voting members of this congregation, two of whom, if possible, shall be outgoing members of the Congregation Council, shall be elected at the annual meeting for a term of one year. (Remove the following: Members of the nominating committee are not eligible for consecutive reelection.)

Suggested updates to the Redeemer Lutheran Church Endowment Fund will be available at the December 11 meeting.

Letter from the Bishop



We have work to do, Church. Let's get to it.

As a nation we've just come through the most divisive, corrosive political campaign in recent memory. Some of us feel we've won, some of us feel we've lost, some are hopeful, some are fearful.



It is worth noting that Hillary Clinton in her concession speech, President-elect Donald Trump in his victory speech, and both Trump and President Obama in their meeting Thursday sounded notes of national reconciliation. By all means it is time to heal the wounds of the past and begin working together for the common good.

It has been suggested that this election was about what has been called "the forgotten ones," white working-class people who for decades have felt dismissed and left out of the orbit of concern of those in power. People who have long been unemployed or underemployed found their voice and spoke loudly at the ballot box, determined to be "the forgotten ones" no more. It has also been suggested that much of the anxiety and fear generated by this election are being experienced by members of minority communities – African American, Hispanic, Islamic, LGBTQ and others – who also consider themselves "the forgotten ones," left out of the concern and compassion of mainstream American culture.

In Matthew's gospel, Jesus holds up a child in the midst of his disciples and tells them "Take care that you do not despise one of these little ones ... (for) it is not the will of your Father in heaven that one of these little ones should be lost." It is very possible Jesus was not only referring to children when he spoke of these "little ones." He may well have been speaking about all those who find themselves on the margins of life, those who feel ignored by the powers-that-be. In other words, there may be a direct connection between the "little ones" of Scripture and the "forgotten ones" of this election cycle. And it is God's desire that not one of these "forgotten ones" be lost. It is our calling as Christ-followers to help them understand that they are found.

Let me suggest some concrete actions we can take in the aftermath of the election.

As people of faith we are called to carry out a "ministry of reconciliation" as "ambassadors for Christ" (2 Corinthians 5:18 and 20). With that ministry in mind, how might we actively champion a new coalition that includes all those determined never again to be ignored? How might we help build bridges so that former antagonists might find common cause in a desire for respect and just treatment? How might we engage others in conversation and "listen our way" into their worlds, trying to understand their deep-down concerns?

Next, we can pray for our new president as he takes up the tremendous, daunting task of leading this nation. President-elect Trump will need the prayers of all of us, regardless of political affiliation or non-affiliation.

Third, we can get busy doing what the Church has always done: worship with one another despite our differences, and carry out Christ's mission to care for, and publicly advocate for, the weak, the marginalized, the voiceless.

Fourth, we can remember that our true hope resides in Jesus Christ. As Christians we believe that we are held together not by our agreement on issues or policies. We are held together by the Gospel of Jesus, which says that we are, each and every one of us, forgiven and loved and accepted by God unconditionally, and that nothing in all of creation can separate us from the love that God has for us in Christ.

Yes, we have work to do, Church. Let's get to it.



¹In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaim-

ing, ²"Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come

near." ³This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord,

make his paths straight."

⁴Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. ⁵Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, ⁶and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

⁷But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! 
host, praising God and saying,

at what the shepherds told them. ¹⁹But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.
