



Intersections are interesting. I tend to get impatient when a light seems to stay red too long, or green not long enough! At a four way, we sometimes wonder "who will go next?" And we won't mention all those streets here in Salina that don't quite match up!

This year we have an intersection of holidays in the church. One, although commemorating a Saint, has become very secular; the other begins our season of preparation for Easter. Valentine's Day is a wonderful time to remember the power of love and relationships and crushes and maybe-s, and our flower shops and card companies do quite well as well! It is a bright happy holiday. But on the same day this year is Ash Wednesday, a time for the church to remember our sins and start the journey to understand the cost of our salvation. The interesting thing though is both holidays are fully rooted in love of God and love of neighbor.

Valentine's Day is rooted in love first and foremost because Valentine died for his faith and devotion to God. We are not sure of the particulars, and there are differing versions of his martyrdom, but we do know he was beheaded because he loved Jesus Christ. That love, at least some legends tell us, was then lived out by helping other Christians who faced persecution in the third century of the church. He was willing to give up all, even his life, for his love of God and his neighbor.

Ash Wednesday also is based in this love. Although we love God we know that as humans we sin, we turn from God, and we also turn from our neighbor, we hurt them in small and sometimes big ways. Ash Wednesday marks us deeply and darkly with the cross to remind us the price Christ paid for our forgiveness. This hopefully compels us through faith to seek the good of our neighbor, to love them as ourselves.

So this intersection that is upon us has some shaking their heads in how they can go together?...Do I skip church to go out with my partner or spouse? Do I skip the roses and candy and the cards and the restaurant reservations and tell my loved one...we will do church this year!? I recommend that you do both. Come to church and hear how the Love of God is expressed for you and your loved ones...and then go out and enjoy the evening.

Outreach

Dear friend,

Thank you again for your generous support of Lutheran Disaster Response in 2017. As we reflect and begin a new year, I'd like to share some thoughts with you.

Because of your generosity, our church is able to walk alongside disaster survivors, meeting urgent needs and helping with the long road to recovery.



- **In Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands**, we provided relief supplies to survivors and supported pastors so that they can focus on caring for their congregations and communities. We are currently assisting Lutheran Social Services of the Virgin Islands and the Caribbean Synod to build their capacities to respond to the disaster.
- **In Haiti and Cuba**, we've replaced lost tools for farmers affected by the hurricane so they can get back to work, helped woman-headed households with cash assistance, and helped families get daily life back to normal with dishes, cookware and blankets.
- **In Texas**, we're part of a group doing case management for survivors of disasters, and plans are underway for a respite retreat for rostered ministers.
- **In Florida**, we've supported our affiliate in providing crisis counseling for thousands of people in 20 counties.

<u>And much, much more</u> is in the works as we continue to work closely with our affiliates, synods, companions and other partners.

Our goal? To have more resilient communities that are less vulnerable to the next disaster. Thanks to you, we're on the way there. I've already been impressed by the resiliency of our neighbors who survived disasters. Here are a few quotes that stuck with me recently:

You'll still see the weekly readings and announcements, but for the elements of the service that come from the red hymnal, you are invited to use the hymnal. (Page numbers will be provided in your new one-sheet bulletin.)

Why are we doing this? We think we'll save only about 17,000 sheets of paper per year, which is about 1½ trees. Our financial savings is only about \$135 a year. So why bother?

Well, we care about stewarding resources. Even a small step in that direction is worthwhile. This has become even more important with the closing of Images Recycling Center.

Lent seemed the perfect time to launch this effort, as we all think about what we will sacrifice for the good of the world.

If you currently use a large-print bulletin, you will continue to have the entire service printed there

Since the prayer list won't fit in this new streamlined bulletin, copies will be available in the gathering space (narthex) for those who want them.

Give us your feedback

We will continue this one-page bulletin format through the summer and then revisit the issue in August. During that time, please tell us what you think. The bulletin streamlining committee (Mary Mertz, Noni Strand, Pastor Strommen, and Anita Strommen) and all Council members want to hear your comments and suggestions.

We hope that within a couple of months people will get used to the new system and value the small bit of good we can do by using our beautiful hymnals instead of paper. USE WISELY.
