We then are called to take this with us as blessings to ourselves but also to bless others. It feeds us in our Stewardship, not as a burden, a toil, but as a sweet response to God's love for us in Christ.

I look forward to our meetings in the coming weeks. Thank you to the Stewardship Committee for putting this together. And may your Duty and Delight be truly a proclamation of the good news of Jesus Christ our Lord.

Letter From Our Bishop





Bethany College President Will Jones washing the feet of a student at the opening convocation.

"By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:35)

Will Jones, the new president of Bethany College in Lindsborg, Kansas, is a uniquely gifted leader who has brought renewed vitality to the campus in "Little Sweden." These days, however, Will Jones is also under attack.

Jones has been targeted by a white supremacist group whose members have left sidewalk chalk graffiti on campus and made harassing and threatening phone calls to Jones because he seeks to recruit a more racially diverse student population and because he is the father of two adopted biracial children. This organization apparently has at least five active members in Central Kansas but is national in scope.

Racism has long been a deep wound in our nation. It is a wound which people of good will are always in the process of healing, knowing that progress, not perfection, is the goal this side of heaven. Part of making progress, I believe, is speaking out against the sin of racism when that sin shouts its vile message.

These are volatile times; our abandonment of political civility is having a coarsening effect on most every aspect of our public life and emboldening bigots who might otherwise have stayed relatively quiet and in the shadows. So now is not the time for followers of Christ to remain silent. Now is the time for us to speak up against the racist "joke," rebut the racist comment, reject the idea of racial superiority.

At the same time, we must not demonize the demonizers. Those who foster race hate and make death threats are also people for whom Christ died and who God loves. So I ask you to pray for Will Jones and his family, the Bethany College community, and those misguided persons who are so driven by fear of those unlike themselves that they threaten both the Jones family and the Bethany community.

The evening begins with a light Supper, prepared and served by Redeemer volunteers, in the fellowship hall. The meal is free, but donations are accepted.



Here's a brief summary of LRC from their website, <u>lutheransrestoringcreation.org/</u>.

Vision

We believe that being earthkeepers is foundational to our Christian vocation and should be integral to the full life and mission of the ELCA.

Mission

We seek to empower and equip ELCA congregations, synods, seminaries, colleges and universities, outdoor ministry sites, public policy offices, social ministry organizations, and the ELCA churchwide leadership to embrace caring for creation in more substantive and meaningful ways. In all that we do, we seek to engage this work as a response to the grace of God manifested throughout creation, in the person of Jesus, and in communion with the Holy Spirit – knowing that it is ultimately God's creative and redemptive love for creation that prompts us and sustains us in this work. The 29th annual convention was held in Springfield, Missouri, July 29-31, 2016 with 106 in attendance. The theme for this year's convention was "Faith Moves Mountains.

Friday evening was the opening to the convention. Rev. Susan Candea, Central States Synod Bishop's Associate Director for Evangelical Mission, shared information from the synod during the opening. The worship service was lead by Jan Creger and the worship committee. The service left women feeling uplifted and renewed. Friday evening's Love offering totaled \$1801.00. After worship women participated in water exercises with Jackie Wilson, Churchwide Women of the ELCA representative, or Pubology, a heartfelt discussion with Stephanie McCormick.

Saturday morning started with Associate in Ministry, Hannah Demaree, leading in devotions. Jackie Wilson shared a message from Churchwide W/ELCA. While the business meeting was in session, non voting members had the opportunity to learn self defense moves led by Don Wilhelm, Chief Instructor Mid-America mixed martial arts, and to assemble over 100 personal care kits for GO:61.

During the business meeting voting members elected Kathy Regehr Vice President, Carolyn Olson Secretary, and Dawn Lessiack, Kathy Yoder Steinke, and Stephanie McCormick board members. Voting members also voted on Triennial delegates for 2017. The following voting members will represent Central States: Alice Burnett, Kim Frederking, Kathy Regehr, Rhonda Schlesselman, Gloria Sharp, Ericka Youngquist and Lisa Youngquist.

During lunch we heard from Rosie Laughlin, a licensed Professional Counselor and Life

Coach, on "Moving Your Personal Mountains."

Saturday afternoon women had an opportunity to hear from Ramona Baker executive director of "Safe to Sleep" a women's overnight shelter, and Casey Alvarez founder of GO:61 who started an outreach ministry to homeless people providing direct services to human trafficking victims.

Women enjoyed dressing up for our Saturday evening banquet as we savored a wonderful meal and entertainment from Terry Wayne Sanders known as "the Face of Branson." We heard from Kandy Pflaster 2017 Triennial Convention Promoter on upcoming information and resources available now on www.welcatg.org. The evening came to an end with raffle and silent auction baskets raising money for Katie's Fund and the Barbara Nelson Fund. We kicked off celebrating the 500 years of Reformation by raising \$414. Sunday morning we had installation of board officers and commissioning of voting members for Triennial. The closing worship ended our 2016 convention.






