My parents, children of the thirties, had a very different understanding of enough than I did and do. My children have a different concept of enough based on probably my teaching them about another word "more".

What is enough though when it comes to who we in the world with a God who loves us? In April during the week of Passover we came together to remember the Jewish Holiday. At the end of the evening we sang a song called Dayenu, it would have been enough, a wonderful song that is found in all Seders. Had we sung all fifteen stanzas we would have sung through an understanding of leaving slavery, miracles, and God being with us and for us. At the end of each stanza the refrain is "It would have been enough" or "Dayenu". Just one of those things in the ever growing list would have been enough, but our God is a God of overflowing love and mercy. The length of the song seems to go on forever and it should give you that feeling, because God is everlasting, not in a tedious boring way, but in a vibrant exciting way. For us as Christians "enough" culminates in Jesus Christ and his death and resurrection. Jesus even from the cross in a way utters the phrase when he says "It is Finished", it is enough what God saw fit to do for us.

I really think if we as beloved children of God would consider what God has done and continues to do, the tiny things and the big things, the "unimportant" things and the "world renowned" things, we will come to understand life not so much in the "more" mindset, but truly in the greatness of God's "enough".



# A Letter From the Bishop

#### A Letter from the Bishop



#### "What are we supposed to do? How are we supposed to respond?"

The questions came from a young woman, a member of the Muslim Student Association at UMKC, toward the end of its recent interfaith symposium. A rabbi, an instructor of Islamic studies, and I had been invited to speak with the group about anti-Muslim, anti-immigrant rhetoric that is welling up in the campaign for president. The news throughout that day had been dominated by the ISIS bombings in Belgium that killed 31 people. The topic was timely.

In our comments the three of us had reflected on our individual faith traditions and how they viewed outsiders. I noted that one of the refrains running through the Hebrew scriptures is God's admonition to God's people to care for the stranger, "for you were aliens in the land of Egypt." Just a few generations removed from my ancestors' exodus from Sweden and Scotland to build a better life in America, I remember family stories about how our relatives stuck together when they got to these shores simply because making your way in a new land is hard. We have that in common.

As I looked out on the crowd at UMKC I realized that what we of European descent do not have in common with these young Muslims is the baggage of discrimination they carry because of violence and intolerance committed by extremists who don't represent them. These students didn't commit the crimes but they're paying for them in the courtroom of public opinion. When someone mentioned that a candidate said police should "patrol and secure Muslim neighborhoods," I could almost feel the rabbi to my right flinch. He knows his history.

So how would you answer the young woman's questions, "What are we supposed to do? How are we supposed to respond?" They're quick to disavow terrorism but don't have a national stage on which to speak. So maybe speaking out isn't the most effective form of response. I suggested that since the only antidote to a lie is the truth, maybe one answer is to live with integrity as people of faith and create relationships with allies and advocates in the interfaith community who can help shape public opinion.

And that, brothers and sisters in Christ, includes us. Let's not wait for them to take the first step. Let's help our fellow God-believers and initiate contact; seek out an opportunity for a conversation with someone of the Muslim faith. It won't be easy – some of us Lutherans have a tough time sharing the peace with each other in church – but I can testify to the benefits of reaching out in good faith and friendship. And if you're in an area where you don't have the opportunity to relate to a Muslim, create the opening with someone of another faith tradition or ethnic background.
