From the
Pastor

"God, you have moved upon the waters, you have sung in the rush of wind and flame; and in your love you have called us sons and daughters: make us people of the water and your name"

This is a refrain in a popular song/hymn by a Lutheran Hymnist, Marty Haugen. I have been thinking of this as I praise God for the rains we have received so timely this year, but also worrying about places around the country that are experiencing flooding. This water that bears and sustains our life can also be destructive. In the vastness of the earth though as water ebbs and flows, rises and falls what we see as destructive as our structures must make way, is it really destruction. I have also been thinking of places hurt by tornados, wild fires, and earthquakes. I heard a Corps of Engineer officer report on T.V. in 1993 that perhaps the attempt we have put in "taming" the waterways was a foolish endeavor. And lately I have heard Firefighters say more and more they will as best as they can let many wildfires burn themselves out understanding that in the long run the fire is cleansing the earth so that even greater and worse fires later do not happen. Sometimes our best intentions, our high hopes of making things better and perhaps more civilized are but fleeting.

"⁶All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field. ⁷The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the Lord blows upon it; surely the people are grass. ⁸The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand forever."
Isaiah 40:6b-8 NRSV

The prophet states this to remind the people that God is God and we are his creatures. It is sometimes hard for us creatures to stomach this. But it is true. We even had a Lutheran prayer the other day calling us co-creators. I must say, I have a problem with that. We do "create" things", that is true, from stuff already created by God. In a way our role is like a child putting together a puzzle. We might correct the child if they say they created or made the puzzle. They put the pieces together, but the puzzle company is the creator.

In my thoughts about all these natural disasters then what do we do? Humans live in beautiful places. We bought our house in what was I am sure prairie and later simply farm ground. We bought because of the view to the east of beautiful Kansas. Our time there in the scheme of God's creation is but fleeting. God's word to us though is Christ. Come what may God is with us and for us. So we as a community in and of Christ get in there; maybe in Mulvane, Baton Rouge, Central Italy, southern California, and Indiana, and are there helping clean up and rebuild communities. Hopefully with our presence we bear the eternal word that reminds them houses and buildings come and go as do we, but God's love in Christ is always there.

Church Council Highlights

Regular Council Meeting August 11, 2016

*Pastor David reported the action was taken at the National Assembly of the ELCA, toward getting more closely aligned with Roman Catholics, Mennonites and African Methodist Episcopal churches.

*Wednesday evening worship will resume on Sept.14.

*Sound System—The Council asked local sound technician Brad Johnson to recommend ways we could record Pastor David's sermons. We also wanted a local technician to provide tech support for our volunteer sound techs. He suggested some new equipment; including the offsets we would get for trading in our current equipment, this latest upgrade would run about \$4,000. The Council decided to move forward with this proposal.

*There is a need for someone organize the Wednesday evening meals and supervise the High School youth.

*Several Redeemer members helped with the Habitat for Humanity Building Blitz.

*Sept. 11 we will have a joint worship service with other ELCA Churches and work together on service project for "God's Work, Our Hands".

Churchwide Assembly

The Churchwide Assembly met in New Orleans on August 8–13 under the theme "Freed and Renewed in Christ: 500 Years of God's Grace in Action." The assembly – the highest legislative body of the ELCA – is comprised of 980 voting members serving on behalf of the 3.7 million members of the ELCA. The ELCA's 65 synods elect voting members to serve at churchwide assemblies.

Participation in the recent Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America was a privilege – inspirational, informative, and encouraging. From outstanding worship to engaging small-group conversation to enlightening Bible studies to hands-on, productive service projects, this assembly was also a call to faithful action by our Presiding Bishop, Elizabeth Eaton.

A number of actions were approved by the 945 voting members in attendance; chief among them are these:

- Elected William B. Horne II of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Clearwater, Fla., vice president of the ELCA. Horne was installed during closing worship Aug. 13.
- Accepted the "Declaration on the Way," a unique ecumenical document that marks a path toward greater unity between Catholics and Lutherans. At the heart of the document are 32 "Statements of Agreement" that state where Lutherans and Catholics do not have church-dividing differences on topics about church, ministry and the Eucharist. The document also presents the differences that remain.
- Approved AMMPARO, the ELCA's strategy to Accompany Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities. The ELCA developed this strategy based on commitments to uphold and guarantee the basic human rights and safety of migrant children and their families; to address the root causes of migration in countries from Central America's Northern Triangle and Mexico and the treatment of migrants in transit; to work toward just and humane policies affecting migrants in and outside the United States; to engage as a church with all of its companions, affiliates, and partners to respond to the migration situation and its causes; and to advocate for migrant children and their families.
- Approved the Ministry of Word and Service roster. Beginning Jan. 1, 2017, ELCA associates in ministry, deaconesses and diaconal ministers will be included in a single, unified roster of Ministry of Word and Service. The accompanying constitutional amendments related to the roster were also considered and approved by the assembly.
- Approved the 2017-2019 budget proposal. The budget includes a 2017 current fund spending authorization of \$65,296,005 and a 2017 ELCA World Hunger spending authorization of \$24.8 million; a 2018 current fund income proposal of \$64,057,220 and a 2018 ELCA World Hunger income proposal of \$25 million; a 2019 current fund income proposal of \$64,151,175 and a 2019 ELCA World Hunger income proposal of \$25 million; and authorizes the Church Council to establish a spending authorization after periodic review of revised income estimates.
- Approved various memorials (proposals) from the ELCA's 65 synods. In addition to memorials considered "en bloc," the assembly separately approved the following: deepening relationships with historic Black churches; toward a responsible energy future; repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery; peace with justice in the Holy Land; justice for the Holy Land through responsible investment; African Descent Lutherans; call to discernment on U.S. foreign and military policy; welcoming refugees; and supporting military personnel and their families, and veterans and their families.
- Elected members to serve on: Church Council, Portico Benefits Services, Mission Investment Fund, Augsburg Fortress, Committee on Appeals, Committee on Discipline and Nominating Committee.
- Adopted amendments to the ELCA Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions.

Archbishop from Russia at Bethany College

Bethany College and the Bethany House of Studies
Presents An Evening with Archbishop Dietrich Brauer
of the
Evangelical Lutheran Church in Russia

Dietrich Brauer was born in Vladivostock, Siberia to a Russian German family. In addition to his seminary degree, Brauer has also studied music and law. Elected in 2011, Brauer is the youngest and first native bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Russia. He is married to Rev. Tatyana Petrenko. He grew up in Moscow and attended Novosaratovka Theological Seminary.

Besides serving as archbishop, he is pastor of the Peter and Paul Cathedral in Moscow. On the Lutheran church's witness in Russian society today, Brauer said the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Russia's ecumenical engagement with the Russian Orthodox Church and with other Protestant faith communities are important contributions. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Russia is a "church of modern theology," working to make Lutheran theology accessible to people in the local language. "Our local theologians are publishing books in Russian and translating works by German Lutheran theologians," Brauer added. The church also organizes theological seminars and runs a radio program on Lutheran theology.

This outstanding occasion is designed for clergy, lay people, teachers, and students who are keenly interested in the global mission of the Christian church. Archbishop Brauer will speak on the state of the Lutheran church in Russia specifically highlighting "Equipping for Service," a ministry that offers theological education for lay leaders to care for and grow their congregations in Siberia.

The event begins with dinner at 5:30 p.m. Reservations are required for this event. Email your registration by September 8th to monsonrb@gmail.com. Those attending are directed to go through the cafeteria line. Payment for the dinner is \$10.05 which is paid at the cash register as one enters the cafeteria, located on the first floor, Pihlbad Student Union. Upon securing your meal, attendees are asked to take a seat in the Levin Dining Room. Archbishop Brauer will address the group at 6:00 pm. An opportunity for questions and informal conversation is available following the presentation. Please remember that reservations are needed because space is limited. 



6:00 - Godly Play for children age 3 through 3rd grade


